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Explora Commemorates National Day of Racial Healing with a week-long Feature Celebration!

Albuquerque, NM – Explora proudly partners with the W.K. Kellogg Foundation for the second consecutive year to bring New Mexico an impactful celebration commemorating the 8th Annual National Day of Racial Healing (NDORH), which was created by the W.K. Kellogg Foundation as an annual celebration to coincide with Martin Luther King Jr. Day (http://dayofracialhealing.org/). Racial healing builds trust and authentic relationships, bridging divides within communities; it is a critical path for ending racial bias and creating a society in which all children can thrive. As a community center dedicated to family learning, bonding, and growth, Explora is honored to facilitate a series of free events for discussion and reflection.

Beginning Tuesday, January 16, 2024, from 4:00 pm- 8:00 pm, the public can join Explora for a NDORH kick-off event, featuring guest speakers, a flamenco dance performance by the National Institute of Flamenco & Conservatory of Flamenco Arts, dinner, and a "watch party" for the prime-time televised town hall on Noticias Telemundo (in Spanish, with English translation), broadcast in partnership with NBCUniversal, which discusses the advancement of racial equality through the experiences of healing and collaboration. On both Wednesday, January 17, and Thursday, January 18, visitors can enjoy Community Days at Explora, featuring tables with information from our partners at the City of Albuquerque's Office of African-American Affairs, Office of Arts and Culture, and Office of Equity and Inclusion; Partnership for Community Action; and many others. A number of schools will visit Explora for field trips and engaging science and art experiences. On Thursday evening (1/18) from 4:00 pm to 8:00 pm, Explora will host a free "Healing Together" Theater Night for teens and adults. Featuring Two Worlds and High Desert Playback, personal Indigenous and Black stories will be shared, along with interactive reflection and resource-sharing. On Sunday, January 21 from 12:00 pm to 6:00 pm, teens will gather in Explora's X Studio for the Teen Summit on Racial Healing, sharing their own stories and experiences, enjoying creative activities and reflection, and advancing equity together. About Explora and X Studio: Explora is a science center and children's museum in Albuquerque, with a mission of creating opportunities for inspirational discovery and the joy of lifelong learning through interactive experiences in science, technology, engineering, art, and math (STEAM). Explora serves thousands of people of all backgrounds each year and is dedicated to improving New Mexico's educational and economic outcomes. The museum has 20,000 square feet of exhibit space on two floors, containing over 250 interactive exhibits that cover a broad range of science, technology and art. Notable exhibits include a laminar flow fountain, a paradox bar, and a high-wire bike suspended two stories above ground. The building also houses a performance theater, gift store, multiple educational program areas, and an in-house exhibits workshop. In addition, Explora offers year-round educational in-house and outreach programs, science-based Adult Nights, and community partnership events.

X Studio, an 8,000-square-foot building expansion, is Explora's new teen center: a place to hang out, experiment, create, and learn. X Studio brings teens and their dreams together with cutting-edge tools, technologies, and mentors—all with a focus on STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, and math). X Studio is defined by the visions and dreams of teens, community members, STEM educators and STEM employers–all who collaborated to build X Studio and the *STEM in the Burque* exhibition featured in its main gallery. Teens are our future, and X Studio is their one-stop shop to explore, hang out, and discover pathways to great jobs that solve big problems and pay well.
